It's a good thing; it's what I do for a living!

I also edited my class yearbook in 1995 under the guidance of Mrs. Rosa Intrevado. I learned leadership, organization, teamwork and responsibility. Speaking of responsibility, the graduating trip to Europe with Mr. (Paul) Sowney, Mrs. (Wendy) McKinnel and Mr. (David) Chisholm was my challenge to get my money together and pay for the trip. I started a job at Mc Donald's on Champlain and dutifully handed over my earnings for that 21 day adventure. It's an experience I will never forget.

All this to say that the teachers and students I mentioned were looking out for me one way or another. I didn't know it at the time, but I appreciate it now. The school's name has changed slightly, but the support and loyalty to LCCHS has not.
